

Our Commitment

As part of Opportunities for Ohioans with Disabilities (OOD), the Bureau of Services for the Visually Impaired (BSVI) is committed to helping people with low vision and blindness succeed in the workforce. BSVI helps eligible individuals prepare for or retain careers consistent with their skills, interests and abilities.

Our services may include evaluation, vocational counseling, training, medical restoration or job placement assistance, as well as instruction in adapting to the work environment. BSVI staff can help eligible individuals obtain low vision aids such as special lenses or filters, magnification devices or computer technology.

Eligibility made Easy

A person doesn't have to be totally blind to qualify for services. If a doctor is unable to correct a person's vision completely, he or she may be eligible.

Vision loss can also progress over time. A person who may not have been eligible to receive BSVI services under a plan for employment, is always welcome to visit with a BSVI counselor to be re-assessed at a later date.

Eligibility is based on three factors:

- a visual impairment or blindness resulting in a substantial impediment to employment
- the person can benefit from services in terms of an employment outcome
- vocational rehabilitation services are necessary for the individual to prepare, secure, retain, or regain employment



The Journey to a Job

Once a person is eligible, he or she will work with a professional counselor. Counselors assist individuals in learning about the labor market and in assessing the job seeker's interests, skills, and abilities in order to develop a career goal and an Individualized Plan for Employment (IPE). This IPE outlines the steps to get or keep a job including what services OOD will provide to assist the individual. The IPE also specifies what the individual job seeker will do in order to reach the IPE career goal.

If the person is currently employed and needs assistance to retain a job, BSVI can help with job retention.

Assistive Technology

There are many types of assistive technology which can enable an individual with a visual impairment to get their job done. This may mean purchasing a commercially available product, modifying an existing product or designing a new customized product. BSVI staff can help identify the most appropriate assistive technology for an individual at their work site. Once obtained, training may be provided to learn to use the assistive technology effectively.
